


make all

things new."

Revelation 21:5

hen Jesus died, virtually no one regarded his death as a victory. Think about all he endured in the day before his death. Jesus was betrayed by one of his twelve closest friends, arrested by guards from the Temple at Jerusalem, put on trial by the ruling council of Jewish leaders, brought before the capricious crowd and subjected to their demands,

sentenced to death by a Roman governor who was harsh and cruel even by Roman standards, physically flogged and verbally taunted, and hung in humiliation on the hard wood of the cross to die between two common criminals, complete with spikes driven through his wrists and a spear-wound in his side. Jesus himself exclaimed



We Christians, who are the first to honor that somber occasion, sometimes run the risk of thinking about Good Friday as a stand-alone moment, when in fact it is directly linked with the rest of that weekend. After Jesus died, his corpse was removed from the cross and laid to rest in a fresh tomb, sealed with a large stone so that no one would intrude. For the entirety of Holy Saturday and the bulk of that weekend, his remains were as completely lifeless as any dead body would be. Then on the third day—on that first Easter morning—Jesus was raised from the dead, and he emerged from his grave with a life that would never die again. Ever since that Sunday, nothing has been the same.

With our upcoming celebration of Easter Sunday and the fifty-day-long season of Easter (because just one day simply will not suffice), we can experience something of what the early Christians experienced: the joy that comes with knowing about Jesus' resurrection. In the first century, like the twenty-first century, everyone knows that ordinarily those who are buried do not become alive again. Yet that is exactly what happened when Jesus was raised from the dead: his dead body was brought back to life in a bold sign of victo-

> ry and triumph over death and evil. This was no ordinary situation, but something altogether extraordinary. The disciples who saw Jesus risen from the tomb, who touched him and spoke with him and ate food with him, could remember his promise that he would be crucified for our sins yet resurrected on the third day. Seeing how faithful Jesus was in his promise-keeping gave his followers—then as

With Jesus raised from the dead, we know that death has been defeated decisively. With Jesus victorious over evil, we know that evil cannot have the last word. With Jesus triumphantly alive again, we know that our salvation from death and evil comes through him alone. How our heavenly Father resurrected his wellbeloved Son shows that God truly is the "Fountain of life and source of all goodness" (BCP 373). And his power over everything destructive that the Devil could devise invites us to place our trust and confidence in this God and in no other.

Easter can mark many things, including the end of winter doldrums and the start of spring rejuvenation. For Christians, Easter is far more important than that. Easter shows how God is keeping his promise to "make all things new" (Revelation 21:5) as he transforms the dead into the living and restores hope where it was lacking. We should rejoice throughout this joyful Eastertide.

Taking Back Revelation

THE LORD GOD WILL

BE THEIR LIGHT ...

REVELATION 22:5

ear Family in Christ,
Grace to you and peace from God
our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I
thank our God for you, especially for the
fervor that you have for reading, marking,
learning, and inwardly digesting the word
of God. This is admirable for Christians of
any age, but especially the one in which

we find ourselves today. Because of that, it pleases me to lead a Bible study once a week so that we can all delve deeper into the riches of Holy Scripture. Therefore, I am excited to teach a new Wednesday evening series on the Book of Revelation.

Revelation is filled with **worship** imagery. In chapters 4 and 5, we see the throne room of

heaven. Revelation 4:8 relays to us that "the four living creatures, each of them with six wings, are full of eyes all around and within, and day and night they never cease to say, 'Holy, holy, holy, is the Lord God Almighty, who was and is and is to come!" In this, we see that the primary objective in heaven is worship. Liturgy can be seen throughout the Book of Revelation where we see things like the reference to Sunday worship as "[being] in the Spirit on the Lord's Day" (1:10) or the use of incense as a symbol of prayer (8:3-4).

Revelation is the **witness** to things to come. This statement does not mean that everything will happen in the end just like it says. What we learn from the extraordinary imagery in Revelation is that God has prevailed, is prevailing, and will prevail finally over the powers of sin, death, and the Devil. Revelation witnesses to God's majesty, glory, and beauty as he dwells in our midst in eternity (chs. 21-22). Another type of witness can be seen too. The army of martyrs (Greek for 'witnesses'), those

whose robes have been made white in the blood of the Lamb (7:14), witnessed to the world the reality of the Triune God. Their confession of faith led to suffering and death. The two witnesses (ch. 11) show the stunning reality of what it means for us to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ to a world run by the Devil.

Revelation is filled with warning signs for Christians. We are warned in Revelation to live according to God's commands, lest we become like the Nicolaitans (2:6). We are warned to preach the true Gospel of Jesus Christ, not a false one, and to follow the one true Lord, lest we fall prey to false prophets like the Jezebel of Thyatira (2:20). Revelation is a line in the sand, if you will. It shows us that faith in Jesus

Christ is the true path and that how we live ought always to reflect the true faith "that was once for all delivered to the saints" (Jude 3). Is your name in the Lamb's Book of Life? Is mine? By God's grace, through faith, it is.

I am writing you these things not to scare you away, but rather to help you see the message of Revelation. This book is intended to challenge, comfort, and strengthen the body of Christ in its mission. I have titled the series "Taking Back Revelation" so that we can shift away from how Revelation has been weaponized throughout history to scare, condemn, and punish those with whom one disagrees. We will find that Revelation has much to say about how everyone lives. Come and see for yourself!

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.



HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

A fter disappearing for more than 150 years, two headstones are returning to their original burial place. We receive some interesting phone calls in the church office, and this is number one for me.

One day I took a phone call from a gentleman who is working on a committee to restore Brent Cemetery. Brent Cemetery is owned by the Roman Catholic Church and is the resting place for many Catholics from America's earliest years.

The gentleman asked if Aquia Church had any headstones that predated the American Revolution as he was tasked by the committee to search out any old headstones in Stafford to see if perhaps those headstones belonged instead to Brent Cemetery. Brent Cemetery had been vandalized when Stafford was occupied by Union troops. The soldiers used the headstones to construct fireplaces while they camped out in Stafford.

As a matter of fact, I replied, Aquia did have two such stones. I relayed the two stories I had heard about the headstones. One headstone was found when Aquia Harbour was being developed; at that time, Aquia Church Cemetery, in close proximity, was asked to take the headstone. The other headstone was

found in Aquia Creek. Again, since Aquia Church Cemetery was close by, another request was made to take a headstone. And so, for many years, the headstone of "Elizabth Simson," which reads "Heare Lyes y Body of Elizabth Simson the daughter of John Simson departed this life March y 14 1698 borne June the 27th 1695," and the headstone of "Mary Flaetcher," which reads "Heare Lyes y body of Mary Flaetcher the daughter of James Flaetch, borne May y 16 departed this life May y 25 1698," resided in the Aquia Church Cemetery.

The Brent Cemetery Committee then presented a report to the Aquia Church Vestry that includes several historical findings, quoted below, indicating that these two headstones might actually have come from Brent Cemetery:

- "Both stones remember infant girls

 one the daughter of John 'the
 Scotsman' Simpson, Captain
 George Brent's known indentured
 servant and possible cousin, the
 other the daughter of James Fletcher, a neighbor who may also have
 been Brent's employee at some
 point."
- "The stones are both cut from what is probably Brent's Aquia quarry sandstone by the same hand in the same style, and only months apart in 1698."

It is possible both stones were stolen from the Brent Cemetery during the Civil War. The report continues:

- "Margaret Waller Ford, who owned Woodstock Plantation then, wrote to complain of Union soldiers stealing Brent tombstones to build fireplaces, presumably in their winter huts."
- "The Simpson Stone was reported found broken in Aquia Creek, not far from Brent Cemetery." It is

- possible "it was dropped and broken as the thieves crossed the creek and abandoned there. [...B]oth pieces were found together, and the stone edges and the break show signs of long water erosion."
- "The Fletcher Stone was found 'near the Aquia Boathouse' in the 1960's. The site now associated with the boathouse is across Route 1, opposite St. William of York Parish a few hundred yards from Brent Cemetery." The headstones predate the Aquia Church Cemetery and neither Elizabeth Simpson nor Mary Fletcher were buried here. "The Brent Cemetery was the only cemetery known [to exist] when the stones were cut."
- "The headstones are of the same sandstone (almost certainly from Brent's quarry), same lettering, font and spellings, same chisel cuts around the edges, both monuments cut in 1698. Same stone, same style, same age = same stone-carver!"

There is evidence tying John Simpson, father of Elizabeth, to Captain George Brent: "From the simpsonhistory.com notes [...] John the Scotsman Simpson was indentured to George Brent, and lived on Woodstock Plantation. In the deposition, his son John Jr. (born 1680-1756) attests to living with his parents on Woodstock from much of the period 1680 through 1695-6. That confirms a relationship between George Brent and John Simpson and means Elizabeth Simpson, borne June y 25 1695, was born on Woodstock Plantation."

There is also evidence tying James Fletcher, father of Mary, to Captain George Brent: "Mary Fletcher's father, James Fletcher was as an orphaned teen formally indentured for five years between 1687 and 1692 to Stafford plantation owner Jonathan Whitall, presum-

ably to learn to grow tobacco. A decade later in 1701, Fletcher bought several hundred acres of tobacco land on Aquia inlet between the plantations of Giles Brent (III) and Joseph Whitson. Apparently he learned well through his indenture, and earned the 3,000 pounds of tobacco he paid for the land in the five years that followed as a grower. His plantation became known as Myrtle Grove. Virginia records identify James Fletcher and two brothers as tobacco growers. So Fletcher was certainly known to, and a neighbor of, Captain George Brent and his sons. Moreover, after Fletcher died, his property was bought by Brent descendants."

The report concludes, "The stones are physically similar and contemporaneous with Captain George Brent; both stones appear to have been found close to the Brent Cemetery; Captain George Brent may have owned the quarry from which the stones came; no other cemetery worthy of such stones existed when the stones were carved; one stone belonged to the daughter of a known servant/employee and possible relations of Captain George Brent, recorded living on Woodstock when his daughter lived, and the most logical place for her burial; the other stone belonged to a known neighbor of Captain George Brent. [...] Finally, as a more correct venue for those stones, the Brent Cemetery is the best candidate."

Given this presentation, the Aquia Church Vestry voted to return the headstones to Brent Cemetery. Two gentlemen from the Brent Cemetery Committee picked up the headstones. The Brent Cemetery Committee has engaged an expert to restore the headstones. After restoration, they will be reinstalled in Brent Cemetery.

A very interesting phone call, indeed, and one I shall never forget. I requested that the Brent Cemetery Committee let me know when the headstones will be reinstalled. I am looking forward to attending that service and to honor "Mary Flaetcher" (Mary Fletcher) and "Elizabth Simson" (Elizabeth Simpson).

February 20, 2018

Dinner and Fellowship (started at 6:30 pm) (hosts: Kathy Trevarthen and Joe Howard). Register), and Douglas McGinty (Register). Treasurer Chris Arey also attended. [Subsequent events are bracketed and italicized.]

Business Session

Fr. Jay opened with a prayer and the Lord's Prayer.

Treasurer's Report Chris Arey.reports that the budget is transitioning to the accrual system. The Treasurer will attend to the Orthodox Church being behind a month in rent. The monthly mortgage payment on the Christian formation and fellowship building is around \$16K. Provisions for possible changes in labels for our restricted funds will go through the Finance Committee.

Minutes from Previous Meeting, presented by Register Douglas McGinty. The motion to approve with three changes was adopted.

R-2014-3 Floor Insulation for Clifton Chapel (tabled; awaiting alternative proposals).

- Appointment of Caitlin Bennett as non-vestry member of administration committee and Charlie Bingay and David Morgan as non-vestry members of finance committee (approved 1/23 by electronic vote).
- Appointment of David Gustafson as non-vestry member of B&G committee and David Morgan as non-vestry member of administration committee (approved 2/9 by electronic vote).
- R-2018-1: Sale of Burial Rights to LaBarre (approved 2/9 by electronic vote).

New Business

Appointment of Larry Moxley as nonvestry member of B&G committee. Approved unanimously.


- R-2018-02: Re-Designation of Memorial Funds in the Special Fund to the General Fund Reserve in the Special Fund (finance committee).
 Adopted unanimously.
- R-2018-03: Establish a Capital Endowment Fund (finance committee). Adopted unanimously.
- R-2018-04: Check-Signing Requirements for ECW (finance committee). Adopted unanimously.
- R-2018-05: Adjustment to the 2018 Budget (finance committee).
 Adopted unanimously.



 Pew Repair Project. Discussed by the Building and Grounds Committee.

- Follow-Up from Bishop Goff's Visit on 2/19/2018. The Bishop's participation in the church services and meeting with the vestry afterwards were greatly appreciated.
- Update on Capital Campaign (received \$859,714.61 from donors making pledges and \$107,126.93 from donors not making pledges, for total of \$966,841.54 received, with \$64,530.71 not yet paid on pledges, all as of 2/11/2018).
- [Tree Action Plan. On March 3-4, 2018, the vestry unanimously approved by electronic vote a proposal to have Mitchell Tree Service cut up and remove from the cemetery a large hickory tree that fell there during the recent windstorm and grind the tree stump, and to have Carroll Memorials reposition the grave markers that were dislocated by the fallen tree.]

Reports from Vestry Committees

Building and Grounds - Bob Brandon.

Bob Brandon discussed possible contracts for painting the church pews. He will talk with Habalis Construction Co. Fr. Jay will work with Aquia Church Association.

The vestry unanimously approved an oral motion (made and seconded from the floor, and thus not a written motion) to accept the bid of 9/7/2017 by Southland Insulators (as prepared by Wade Linton) to install random fill open cell foam insulation (between 5.5" and 8.5") under as much as possible of the historic building of our Clifton Chapel property, located at 60 Clifton Chapel Lane in Stafford, Va. The vestry accepted the bid at a cost not to exceed a maximum of \$4,300.00. The funds for this project are to be taken from Aquia Church assets line #1082 (restricted for Clifton Chapel), which as of Jan. 31, 2018 has \$5,023.34. The vestry chose the second option of the bid (foam option for crawl under floor/all) at a basic price of \$3,250.00. The vestry also selected the option of extra insulation at an additional price of \$1,040.00.

Administrative Committee - Jean Golas.

Dave Morgan researched security systems. Tyco made an attractive bid with a better price.

The committee set goals.

Finance Committee - Dickie Boes.

Finances and the Treasurer's Report were discussed.

Reports from Junior Warden and Senior Warden

Jr. Warden, by Bob Brandon

He signed the paperwork reserving Patawomeck Park for Memorial Day Sunday. Work and termite treatment were done at the Rectory.

Sr. Warden, by Joe Howard

He thanked the ECW for their great work on Bishop Goff's reception, as well as the vestry for the reception and meeting. He also thanked the committees for their great work and Mike Golas for arranging the Museum of the Bible trip.

Report from Rector

Fr. Jay delivered the Rector's Report. He expressed appreciation for Bishop Goff's visit.

A report was made on the Second Capital Campaign. John Sondermann indicated that \$33 K was needed to reach \$1 million. Fr. Jay noted that there will be a matching challenge gift toward the next capital campaign. A letter is being drafted asking recipients to fulfill their pledges.
