#### FROM THE RECTOR

#### Our Time Together, Before the Bell Tolls

To man is an island," wrote the Anglican priest and poet John Donne in a decidedly anti-modern meditation. Donne lived at the start of modernity, with its emphasis on breaking down the material world and social structures alike for closer examination in a way that has left nature and society better understood in some ways and yet rendered each constituent part more isolated than before in other ways, and he could already see that the modern era would not always be kind or helpful in edifying human life. If you read the rest of that poem from an anthology of poems or from a website, you might realize that Donne was aware of something important: what people experience in modernity is more often breaking-down than building-up.


Donne's poem compares the loss of any person's life to the loss of any bit of ground to the sea. The loss of any part of earth—whether an entire mountain or even a mere sample of dirt—is still an irreplaceable loss with great significance. The same is true, Donne held, about human beings: the loss of any one of us diminishes the broader society or the entire human race that ideally would have remained intact. All of us are interconnected with one another: we value each other, we are important to each other, we need each other. Or at least those things *should* be true. In this poem, Donne contends that because each person is part of a greater whole, each person is really involved with the rest of humankind. Or at least should be.

My purpose here is not to attack modernity nor even the new post-modern era (though I have grave reservations about both), nor to wax poetically about death (which is a central theme in Donne's poem), but rather to draw from Donne's insight about the nature of human beings for some direction about Aquia Church and our parish life together.

Nowadays it would be easy for someone to assume that no individual matters very much, that one person can easily replaced by another, and that there is little or no consequence to the group or to the individual if someone were to leave or depart. But that has never been true from God's perspective, and it should not be true from the Church's perspective or from our own view of each other. Given our competing schedules and conflicting priorities and varied commitments in life, we can delude ourselves into thinking that each of us can function successfully in isolation from each other, apart from the rest of the Church. But losing fellowship and our interconnectedness when a person drifts away or walks away can be hard for us all to bear, in ways that we cannot always appreciate until it is too late—when the bell tolls.

The resumption of our church's program year—with the return of Sunday school and youth group, Homecoming and Fall Fest, and with the many opportunities we Christians have for renewing past friendships and making new ones—can be a remarkable experience for this part of the Body of Christ and for each of us as members of that greater Body. But in order for that to happen, we need to acknowledge that each of us as individuals is indeed part of a larger life—the whole communion of saints on earth now and saints at rest and saints yet to be—and we are joined intimately to them. Or at least should be. It's time for us to reach out to others, before the bell tolls for thee.

#### FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

#### **Discovering the Bible**

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank our God for you in the fact that you hunger for a deeper knowledge of our Lord through the reading of Holy Scripture. I have been very pleased during my time at Aquia with how robust our Bible study programming is. I have also been impressed, on the whole, with the attendance at our Bible study offerings. I do, however, hope that we can continue to grow in both our knowledge of Scripture and in our relationship with Jesus Christ, both corporately and individually.

It is for that reason that I will begin a new series in September that goes through the Bible from beginning to end. The series is called Discovering the Bible: A New Generation from The Kerygma Program. The series will last roughly 30 weeks, i.e. both the fall and spring semesters of the school year. We will journey through the Old Testament for fifteen weeks. This time will cover the age of the patriarchs, the exile and exodus, the kingship of Israel, the Assyrian conquest and exile, the Babylonian exile and restoration, the prophecy of the coming messiah, and more. The New Testament section will cover the Gospels, i.e. the Good News about the crucified and raised messiah Jesus and his teachings, the nascent church in Acts, Paul and his missionary journeys, and the goal for Christians: eternal union with the Triune God in the new heaven and new earth of Revelation.

At my ordination, I had to vow before the congregation gathered that I believed Holy Scripture to contain all things necessary for salvation. I have always believed that, but I believe and teach that even more fervently today than I did before. Scripture is our story. It is the story of our God who created us in love, who called us back when we sinned, who took on human flesh, and offered us eternal life through his sacrifice on the cross and his resurrection from the dead. This same God, our Lord



and Savior Jesus Christ, beckons us to him in the words of Scripture. It would do every Christian good to plumb the depths of Scripture, most especially since Biblical literacy is at an all time low in the United States (not to mention in the Episcopal Church). This book is living and vibrant. It is foundational to our Christian faith. And since it contains all this necessary for salvation, we ought to read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest what is found therein. Scripture will inevitably lead us deeper in our relationship with Jesus Christ and it will convict us to go out into the world to share the Gospel.

As you discern your ability to join us on Wednesday mornings, please note that we will be using a packaged program. That means that we have to buy the Resource Book. Said book costs \$32. I will have some on hand. For those who want to join the study, you can bring a check made out to me or cash for purchase of the book. For those concerned about the cost of the book, please contact me. Scholarships are available. Both Fr. Morris and I wholeheartedly endorse the series. We hope that you can join as we work our way through the pages of this book of profound importance.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

In fact, it seems that the times are far more than interesting. These times can sometimes feel overwhelming, with all of the violence, discord, and dissension that we face daily on TV news and in newspapers. Because what is going on in the world that gets the most publicity is so negative, it is difficult not to become cynical or negative. Because of what we see and hear, it is important and beneficial for us to gather together to worship, hear the GOOD NEWS of Scripture, and to celebrate Holy Communion. This consistent activity grounds us in a positive approach to our lives. We are blessed to have a strong parish family, with members who work so hard in so many ways to support Aquia, to support each other, and to bring the kingdom of God closer to earth in this place.


Aquia itself is living in interesting times as well. I am personally excited about the new Sunday morning worship and Sunday School schedules. My hope is that this change will be beneficial for Aquia and will permit more socializing among our parish family members, by combining the 9 a.m. service with the 11:15 a.m. service to form the new 10 a.m. service. This means that Sunday School and Morning Call can start at 9 a.m., which will permit those attending the 7:30 a.m. service and those attending the 10 a.m. service to participate together at Morning Call. I look forward to meeting more of our parish family members through this new schedule.

What I wanted to mention about this change is that I thought it would be a simple matter of changing some numbers on our service time board, and declare it "DONE" and move forward. However, my original perception was not an accurate assessment of all the complexities involved in such a change. Once the Vestry, Rector, and Assistant Rector started discussing this, it became clear that a lot more was involved, including the Music Ministry and Choirs, Sunday School, Morning Call, the early morning breakfast, Altar Guild, those

counting the offerings, Lay Eucharistic Ministers, and other ministries. Because of those complexities, it was determined that a parish-wide survey was necessary. The response to the survey was outstanding. Based on those survey results, the changes in the services we fashioned to accommodate the wishes of the vast majority of our parish family members. That was the proper approach to take before making such changes. I hope that these changes can be made in your personal situations without significant upheaval.

With colleges back in session, teachers, coaches and students participating in sports, marching bands and other early activities already starting up their programs in preparation for Stafford schools opening right after Labor Day, we need to gear up our thinking for the important Aquia Fall Activity Schedule. It will be fun this year! I guarantee it!

#### VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

#### July 17, 2018

Dinner and Fellowship. Started at 6:30 p.m.; hosted by Fr. Morris. In attendance were Rector Fr. Jay Morris, Assistant Rector Fr. James Rickenbaker, Youth Representative Ethan Shoen, Sr. Warden Joe Howard, Jr. Warden Bob Brandon, Dickie Boes, Gary Perkins, Jean Golas, Jackie Chichester, Kathy Trevarthen, Curt Bradford, Asst. Register John Sondermann, and Register Douglas McGinty. Also in attendance were Treasurer Chris Arey and Aquia Church Association representative Earl Bradford. Fr. Jay opened with a prayer and the Lord's Prayer. [Subsequent events are bracketed and italicized.1

**Business Session (starting at 7 p.m.)** Earl Bradford: The Aquia Church Association representative proposed a plaque to honor the late David W. Wirman, Jr., for his many contributions to Aquia Church and Clifton Chapel. The approval and location were left to the discretion of the vestry, which discussed both afterwards.

Treasurer's Report by Chris Arey. The vestry received and discussed the report.

Minutes from the previous meeting. R-2018-11: Purchase of Washer/Dryer for Rectory (approved 7/8/2018 by electronic vote). The pair cost about \$1600, with installation. The resolution was adopted unanimously.

#### **New Business**

- R-2018-12: Employee Health Insurance Adjustments (Finance Committee). The resolution concerned insurance for family members and was approved unanimously.
- R-2018-13: Adjustments to the 2018 Budget (Finance Committee). Income and expense adjustments were made. The resolution was approved unanimously.
- Covenant for Aquia Church Capital Improvement Fund (Finance Committee). The covenant was approved unanimously. The contribu-

- tions of Chris Arey in drafting the covenant were gratefully acknowledged.
- Report on 2017 Financial Records and Practices. The Audit Vestry approved unanimously the Audit Committee Report.

#### **Discussions Continued from Previous** Meeting

- Draft of New Bylaws. Unanimously approved with all the changes recommended by Chris Arey.
- Clifton Chapel. Steve Anderson finished work on the Fleurries and can resume work on Clifton Chapel. St. Herman's Orthodox Church may have decided to buy some land in the Courthouse Road area for a new campus, but it is unclear whether the land has been bought
- Habalis Construction Work in Historic Church. Jr. Warden Bob BranReports from Vestry Committees don is working on the punch list. The church administrator, Dennise LaBarre, can cut the check to Habalis once Bob clears the punch list. [The punch list has been cleared, and Habalis has been paid.]
  - Schedule for Worship Services. Fr. Jay discussed the survey results on the schedules for worship services. Fr. Jay and Fr. James recommended the following times: 7:30 a.m. – Eucharist, Rite One, no music; 8:30 a.m. fellowship breakfast in the great hall on the end farthest from the church; 9 a.m. - Christian Formation for All Ages (with Morning Call in the great hall on the end closest to the church and with Sunday School meeting in the classrooms downstairs); 10 a.m. – Eucharist Rite One or Rite Two, with music; and 5 p.m. - Evening Worship (typically Holy Eucharist). The advantages of the new schedule were addressed, including more fellowship between parishioners from different worship services, consistency of time-frame for Sun-

day School and Morning Call, greater convenience for volunteers, and more daylight for the 5 p.m. service. The vestry unanimously approved the changes to start on the first Sunday in August. [The changes were announced on the following Sundays and began on Aug. 5, 2018. Attendance for the 10 a.m. service on Aug. 12, 2018 was 98.1

- Administration. The Land of Promise Baptist Church asked to have services during 8 - 9:30 a.m. on Sundays and another gathering at some time on Tuesday, renting our parish hall downstairs. The vestry unanimously approved on a trial basis.
- Finance. Dickie Boes noted the previous discussion of the Audit Committee Report.
- Building and Grounds. Bob Brandon reported that Chris Wanner volunteered to repair part of the fence. The painting of the Fleurries has been completed. Some of the plaster is separating in the church.

#### Reports from the Wardens

- Sr. Warden Joe Howard commended the committees for doing great jobs. Fr. Jay expressed the need for vestry to provide a volunteer who would serve as Fall Fest co-chair with ECW president Briget Kane.
- Jr. Warden Bob Brandon provided the Building and Grounds report.

#### TREASURER'S NOTES

he church's financial affairs, like Lyour family's financial affairs, are always in progress. Paying normal operating expenses, salaries, benefits, utilities, and the mortgage on our new building happens in the background, but for the new building were over \$3M, is a vital church function. Aquia is blessed to have able servants, Dennise and Sue, who ensure that funds contributed to Aquia are properly allocated and disbursed. Your Finance Committee takes its duties seriously, and deliberates at length before a financial recommendation is made to the full vestry. Likewise, your vestry evaluates all financial considerations in a serious and faithful manner.

Earlier this year, we concluded our second Capital Campaign - raising over \$1M, truly a remarkable feat. However, impressive as this was, it is not sufficient to retire our debt – all told, costs and we continue to service a monthly mortgage payment of \$16,623.18 per month. As we look toward building a budget for 2019, and the necessity to renew a campaign to finance our mortgage, all have a part to play.

One of the fundamental precepts of any financial plan is to distinguish between wants and needs. Speaking personally, it often takes 'cleaning our glasses' to gain an honest perspective in



what that entails. Though the 'dog days' of August drone on, I would ask all who read this to consider a fresh perspective on our faithful refrain, based on 1 Chronicles 29:14, which states, "All things come from thee, O Lord, and of thine own have we given thee."
