FROM THE RECTOR

ow that November is here, the shopping season for Christmas gifts will shift into high gear. Just as the wise men brought gifts to the newborn King, so we can treat each other royally and remember each other thoughtfully with tokens of affection and appreciation. But lingering in long lines to make those purchases is no fun; doing the wrapping and the delivering can be a hassle, too. Many folks already have enough 'stuff' and aren't seeking to accumulate more unnecessary possessions. And does your friend or your relative *really* need yet another tacky tie, even more earrings, gloves and scarfs to misplace again, or the twenty-first century equivalent of a fondue pot? Wouldn't it be nice, for a change, to give and receive gifts that matter?

In case you are on the lookout this Christmas for gifts that matter, you might consider purchasing something that doesn't require going to a store, doesn't need wrapping paper or gift bags, and doesn't end up stashed away in a closet. As an alternative to the usual sort of gift, could you make a charitable donation in honor of your intended recipient, where your cheerfulness in remembering that person gets combined with your hands-on altruism?

Something I plan to do this Christmas, more than ever before, is donating funds to specific charities that will make a favorable difference in the lives of real people for years to come. Part of the inspiration for my approach comes from good examples of ministry groups right here at Aquia Church. From time to time, our Vacation Bible School has collected funds for mosquito nets for families in developing countries, and our outreach ministry has collected "Cash for Cows and Change for Chickens," with funds used for purchasing livestock and poultry through the Episcopal Relief & Development organization. You can do the same kind of thing yourself! Simply go to the website for ER&D's online catalog of "Gifts for Life" (https:// support.episcopalrelief.org/gifts) and select from a variety of options, ranging from a

share of a pig (\$20), a share of a flock of chickens (\$25), or an entire goat (\$80) to the planting of fruit trees, sugar beans, and other crops. Other choices available with ER&D's "Gifts for Life" include health care for mothers and newborns, vitamins and preventative medicine, clean water and well supplies, and disaster relief kits, with a wide range of prices available. Similar options are available through the website of a comparable organization, Heifer International (www.heifer.org, then click "Gift Catalog" or "Donate").

Another organization that you might select is Gideons International, through whose website (www.gideons.org, then click "Donate" or "Shop") you can help to spread the Word of God in printed form. With the Gideons, for as little as \$5, you may donate a Bible that will go into a hotel guest room somewhere, or you may contribute to the purchase of pocket-sized New Testaments with Psalms that can be distributed to youth organizations. In my travels, I always note where the Gideons have been welcomed to place a Bible. I also remember how friends have donated Gideons Bibles in honor of my ministry, just as friends have donated Heifer International livestock in my name, and surely those were gifts that did not have to be exchanged or returned, nor did they go unused!

These are not the only charitable organizations that would benefit from our support; there are other worthy causes, too. But these are specifically Christian charities that have earned wide respect for their transparent management of financial resources and for their efforts to maximize the local impact of contributions, rather than subsidizing extravagant overhead. From groups like these, you can give gifts that matter.

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

The Importance of Christian Education

Dear Family in Christ, Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank our God for you, especially for your faithfulness in worship. This element of the Christian identity is essential for a relationship with Jesus Christ. I am thankful for the fact that Aquia's pews are filled on Sunday mornings with people who are zealous for the Lord. This is a good thing. It is for that reason that I would like to encourage each of you, adults and children, to continue in this faithfulness not just in church, but also in Sunday school.

Attendance in worship is a necessary component of the Christian faith. Quite frankly, if one believes that one can be a Christian on one's own terms, by himself or herself, without the support of others, then one is sorely mistaken. Church attendance is essential to Christian identity and practice. To go deeper, though, attendance in Christian education is important as well. It is important because Christians of all ages need more than the typical 10-15 minute sermon to grow in faith. Your clergy can cover a lot of ground in Biblical interpretation and application in that time, but there is much more that needs to be said. We offer Bible studies on Wednesdays for in-depth study of Scripture. We offer Sunday school on Sunday mornings so that people of all ages can grow in their knowledge of the Lord. We offer these educational opportunities on Sunday mornings, Wednesday mornings, and Wednesday evenings to try to accommodate the varied schedules of the busy folks at Aquia. Schedules are hectic. Things inevitably will get in the way of attendance at church. They will certainly get in the way of Sunday school. But the question that each Christian must ask himself or herself is this: Should we allow anything to get in the way of attendance at church and Sunday school?

Alongside attendance at Christian education opportunities, parents have the additional responsibility to educate their children in the faith. This is what all parents promised when their children were baptized. Vows made to God are not meant to be broken. This means that parents have the responsibility and duty to talk to their children about faith. Parents are responsible for seeing that their children own their faith. Teaching the faith at home is as important as having our kids learn it in Sunday school. As parents, we cannot assume that our children will learn the faith by osmosis. That just does not happen. We ought to take time each day or, at the very least, once a week to sit down, read Scripture with our children, and talk with them about what it means in their life. Parents, if you do not feel confident in this, feel free to speak with your clergy. We can offer some helpful ideas for how you can engage in this important work. But do not underestimate the confidence that can be gained from your own participation in the Christian education opportunities that we offer.

As a priest in Christ's one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church, it is of great importance to me that the Church is faithful to her Lord and knows him well. It is my hope and prayer that we will see you at church, in Sunday school or Bible study, and out in the world sharing the Good News of God in Christ.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

OUTREACH

The Outreach Committee did not meet over the summer; however, we kept up with our projects. We collected \$1,350.50 from our piggy and cow banks and purchased a cow, 2 pigs, 3 goats, 2 flocks of chickens, and bees and honey through Episcopal Relief and Development. We also collected school supplies for disadvantaged children and delivered over 500 items to the Department of Social Services.

We participated in National Night Out on the first Tuesday in August. After that night's storm did not dampen our spirits, we were able to spread the news about what is happening at Aquia Episcopal Church and handed out ice pops and glow sticks.

On Oct. 14, we started collecting shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child. We ordered the new larger, stronger pre-printed shoe boxes and have them available for distribution. Operation Christmas Child is now more restrictive on what should be in the shoe boxes: no candy, no chocolate, no food or snacks, no toothpaste or toothbrushes, and no war toys.

In November we will have our Christmas available with donation cards for our Doves and Adopt-A-Family collections. The Doves are mentally challenged adults in our community, and the Adopt-a-Family children and seniors are referred by the Department of Social Services.

We met on Tuesday, Oct. 2, and packed 60 meals at 6:30 p.m. for Stafford Junction's "Brain Builders" program and delivered them on Oct. 4.

Aquia's Newest Ministry is Now a Year Old

In September of 2017, a new ministry, Aquia's Pantry, was established to meet the growing needs of our community, with the notion to offer a healthier choice of food options like fresh fruits and vegetables, milk, eggs, and cereals. Among other things offered, our "shoppers" may find personal hygiene products, bread from Panera, or frozen breakfast sandwiches gleaned from the local Wawa.

Aquia's Pantry is a market-style pantry, open on Wednesday evening during Aquia's Table, where guests can choose items at no cost. It was patterned after The Table at St. George's Episcopal Church in Fredericksburg. As a matter of fact, a lot of the produce comes from what The Table couldn't give away at their Tuesday distributions.

Over the course of the last year, many hundreds of pounds were collected from St George's, Stafford Church of God, and the North Stafford Farmers Market (in conjunction with S.E.R.V.E., a local food bank). Records show the gleaning team collected 986 lbs. of fresh produce through this program so far in the 2018 growing season. The 2017 total is estimated at 1,700 lbs.

It is also through the generosity of some parishioners that other essentials may be purchased from the grocery store. Weekly purchase costs for our ministry right now are between \$30 and \$45, with a goal to purchase up to \$75 to \$100. The pantry's budget for 2018 is around \$900.

All of this happens through the efforts of volunteers, without whom none of this would be possible. Aquia is blessed to have so many dedicated people who truly understand the meaning of discipleship, putting the body of Christ in motion.

We hope to offer a baked potato bar fundraiser or a similar event in November to benefit this ministry, so please participate if you're able.
