

FROM THE RECTOR

On The Lenten Journey

Some people could not attend an Ash Wednesday service due to illness, work, or other obligations, while some other people did not attempt to begin the season of Lent in this meaningful way. I worry, pastorally, that such folks will miss something important. But fortunately there

are always fresh opportunities to join in the Lenten journey, and hope springs eternal. Here are some images that might help you appreciate better what Lent offers, so that you can start to walk this way with us.

Some aspects of Lent are much like making a U-turn. When you are heading somewhere and realize that you have veered off course, you need to change direction and follow a different path; you might even need to turn around and begin again. That is what repentance means: doing an about-face course -correction in life, maybe even starting all over. On

Ash Wednesday and throughout Lent, we are invited to repent and return to the Lord, which means giving up the habits, attitudes, and actions that lead away from God, so that instead we can go in the right direction for a change. As part of a holy Lent, we need to abandon some old assumptions along with our vices, and adopt some faithful perspectives as we try to develop some virtues by God's grace, confident that his grace is ready to guide us along the road of life like a map or GPS assists us in reaching our destination successfully.

Some aspects of Lent are much like cleaning house. No matter how small your apartment or how huge your house, inevitably some junk and clutter accumulate, and we need to clear it out. There's the daily trash, the bulk mail you didn't request, the inexplicable items that needlessly take up space and distract us from en-

joying the blessings that truly matter. Our sins are like that, too: they pile up in the ordinary course of everyday life through the bad things we do and the good things we leave undone, and they get in the way of our seeing things rightly and living faithfully. I know only too well what I

need to clean up around my home and my life, and now is a good time for spring cleaning.

Some aspects of Lent are much like the arrival of spring. In a natural rhythm, the dark coldness and harshness of winter yield organically to brighter light, warmer days, and our readiness to come out of hibernation and re-engage. The more pleasant temperatures can relieve our wintry isolation and promote the growth of budding flowers and trees. Similarly, each one of us—no matter how stained or scarred by sin we are—has been created in the image of God and has potential goodness inside that is waiting to burst forth

when there are favorable conditions for flourishing. There is obviously a key difference between the natural order and the moral order: that winter will give way to spring is far more inevitable than that our innate and original goodness will automatically shine in the absence of faithful training and encouragement. But at Aquia Church, as we worship together with God's holy Word and holy Sacraments and with one another, share in Christian formation together, enjoy fellowship together, and together undertake service to others in the Name of Jesus Christ, God can plant the good seed he has given us and nourish it lovingly in the light of his Son and the reign of his kingdom (my apologies for the agricultural puns!).

With these images of how Lent helps us, will you now join us in the Lenten journey?

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

What is Lent?

ear Family in Christ, Grace and peace to you from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I thank our God for you, especially for how you reverently observe the cycle of the liturgical calendar. Year in and out, we participate in the fasting and feasting that come with the special observances related to the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. As you are aware, we are now in the midst of one such major season of the church: Lent. We all know what we do during Lent. We know how we observe Lent, with fasting and prayer and special services during Holy Week. But do you know what Lent itself is and why we observe it?

Lent comprises the forty days spanning from Ash Wednesday through the evening of Holy Saturday. (To be fair, there are more than forty days in that timeframe, but fasting is not required to be observed on Sundays, which are always a reminder of the resurrection.) The forty day fast has deep roots in Scripture. Moses spent forty days atop Mt. Sinai with God in Exodus 24. Elijah spent forty days and nights walking to Mt. Horeb in 1 Kings 19. On top of those, the number forty is very important in the Old Testament. God sent rain to flood the earth for forty days and nights in Genesis 7. The Israelites wandered in the desert for forty years as referenced in Numbers 14. Jonah's prophecy brought forty days of judgment on Nineveh in Jonah 3. Chief among the references to forty, though, is the fact that Jesus fasted and prayed for forty days and nights in the desert during his time of temptation. We take forty days during the year to fast and pray, to repent and return to the Lord,

so that we can show God how sorry we are for our sins.

But do we celebrate Lent just to have another reference to the number forty in our life? By no means. In the early church, Lent was a time wherein people who had fallen away from the faith were given the opportunity to undertake public penance so that they could return to the church. Lent also served as the final period of baptismal instruction before baptisms took place on the eve of Easter. In the ancient church, baptism took place almost exclusively on the eve of Easter. Lent then was characterized by fasting in preparation for the feast of Easter as well as in preparation for baptism.

You will notice during Lent that the service looks different than it does normally (save for Advent). We use the Penitential Order before the Eucharist. This means that we begin the service with the Exhortation. This calls us to task for living in sin and helps us to prepare our hearts and minds for worship. We then say the Ten Commandments to remind ourselves that though God is merciful, he desires us to be obedient to him. We continue with confessing our sins to God and thereby ask God to set us back on the right path. We follow this pattern each Sunday during Lent so that it can reform us and remind us of the importance of repentance in our daily life, especially as we prepare to celebrate the magnificent feast of the resurrection on Easter.

Live into the Lenten season. See you in church. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

OUTREACH

The Outreach Ministry met on Feb. 4 and packed 50 tide-me-over bags for the students participating in the Brain Builders program through Stafford Junction. We will ask the Sunday school to help us with the March bags.

The Lenten Cross will be available on the Sunday after Ash Wednesday. We will ask the other ministries what items they would like added to the Cross.

We want to host a chili cook-off on March 29. We set the menu, which will include the tasting of each chili entry, a bowl of chili, crackers or cornbread, cheese and other toppings, a drink, and dessert. We will charge \$10 for adults and \$5 for children under 12. The cost for a family would be a maximum of \$40. Ticket-holders will vote on their favorite chili and the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners of the cook-off will receive medals.

The dinners for Head Start will be on April 6 and April 20. The first April

dinner will be at Melchers and the second will be at a new location at North Star.

We will host the annual Craft Show on May 2 and have sent out invitations to the crafters in our area who participated last year. We have six crafters signed up already. The Craft Show occurs alongside the spring Pig Roast. We will have a sign-up sheet for help setting up on May 1 and cleaning up on May 2.

After discussion, it was decided that we would no longer be able to manage National Night Out on the first Tuesday in August. We will see if another ministry can take it over.

Our March meeting will be on Tuesday, March 3 in the Great Hall. We need new members to help us with our projects. Please consider joining this active and rewarding ministry.

In the business world, during a work retreat, one might be given a 15- or 30-minute time of reflection. Among those attending the work retreat, the reasons for attending were usually varied, the topics on which to reflect were usually multiple, and those topics generally dealt with past performance. Our diocesan ECW quiet day retreat last year was reflective as well, but it was also revealing or eye-opening. It taught me not just to listen, but also to reflect and to get clear—which is something I am not always prepared to do.


I did not realize how often I would want to participate in my own quiet day, or how the day taught me the importance of my quiet time. It isn't always about my relationship with God; it can be on my reflection of the beauty of our earth. I may reflect on the day before it starts and gather inspiration to work towards or make change. There are no rules that

I have established for myself, except perhaps for opening prayers and closing prayers. My most important guideline—which is self-imposed—is simply to take the time.

I am unable to attend this year's diocesan ECW Lenten Quiet Day. But I do plan to attend Aquia's own Lenten quiet day on March 21, under the direction of our assistant rector, the Rev. James Rickenbacker, and featuring a guest speaker: the Rev. Kyle Tomlin, rector of the Episcopal Church of the Messiah in Fredericksburg. The focus will be on the atonement accomplished by Jesus Christ. I hope many ladies of the ECW will plan to join me and attend, beginning at 9 a.m. in the conference room of the CFFB building on that Saturday.

Treasurer's Report: by Chris Arey. \$12,000 was redeemed from the Dipple Fund for cemetery operations in 2019 and 2020. The nuts sale netted about \$2K.

three-year term was approved without dissent by email on Dec. 21, 2019. All five members were elected by acclamation at the Jan. 5, 2020 Annual Meeting.]

Reports from Vestry Committees

Administration: by Jean Golas. The vestry already is up to date as to committee status.

Finance: By Dickie Boes discussed the Budget for 2020. Amendments to line items were discussed. The budget as amended was approved unanimously. The question was raised as to whether the Church could pay for at least some of the cleaning at the Parish House. The pledges so far are \$394,999.92 from 91 adult pledges, plus over \$704.00 from 10 youth pledges as of 12/16. Current Total for Matching-Challenge Opportunity: \$60,201.35 as of 12/16. Dickie further reports that Goal 8 for the committee has been completed. Chris Arey indicated that the e-giving program needs to proceed. Fr. Jay asked if \$200K should be applied to reduction of the principal on the mortgage for the CFFB, and the vestry agreed. Building and Grounds: by Ron Korth. The floor project has gone well on the Administrator's side of the Fleurries. Fr. Jay's section will be done in January 2020. A motion to proceed with Prudent Homes for the crawlspace project at the Fleurries was approved unanimously, with funds coming out of the Anne E. Moncure fund. Everything is going

Business Session

In the absence of an elected register, the rector appointed Fr. James Rickenbaker to serve as acting register.

Treasurer's Report by Chris Arey Chris indicated that some things about the budget-to-actuals document for the end of 2019 will be changed to report everything correctly. During February, Chris, Charlie Bingay, and the office staff will work together to fix all of the issues. Chris highlighted the changes reflected on the cover letter. The balance of the rectory expense line from 2019 has been placed into new asset line 1081. We paid 14 months of property insurance in 2019, so Chris will look into that in the week following the vestry meeting.

Minutes from Previous Meeting by Register Douglas McGinty

The minutes were unanimously approved (as amended) in the meeting.

- Pledges for 2020: \$407,319.92 from 95 adult pledges, plus \$1,424.00 from 10 youth pledges (as of 12/31)
- Final Total for Matching-Challenge Opportunity: \$181,799.35 (as of 12/31 deadline)

Reports from Vestry Committees

The committees did not meet in January. Kit Stolz indicated interest in being on both the administration and finance committees, and the vestry approved. Fr. Jay indicated that there is a need to repopulate the committees with nonvestry members. Some possible options were brought to the vestry.

Reports from Senior Warden and Junior Warden

Jr. Warden: Ron Korth indicated that he and others completed the rector's office floor project in one day. The crawlspace under the Fleurries was encapsulated. Aces Electric put in a \$1200 bid to replace the fluorescent bulbs in great hall. Ron bought LED replacements to try out to perhaps do some of the work ourselves. The vestry had a conversation about service contracts. Sr. Warden: Bill Hoffman asked everyone to consider being register for vestry. Bill also volunteered to be chairman of the administration committee for a period of six months, until Carrol Frederick or another member might take over as chair.

Report from Rector

Fr. Jay acknowledged the remarkably high number of vestry members who had faced major illness or who had close relatives to die during the past year, even as the vestry as a group worked hard to fulfill its duties. He noted that the vestry even had two members die in the past three weeks (Larry Moxley on 1/6 and Jean Golas on 1/21). There was, at the time of the meeting, no certainty about the funeral arrange-

ments for Jean. [Jean's funeral was held on Sunday, Feb 9 at 1 p.m.] The remainder of the clergy report will be distributed at a later time.
