# "Gift of Life" Honorees

In 1922, Miss Sallie Carrington Deane founded the "Gift of Life", in hopes of establishing a fund to help train women in church work. In 1930, the Gift of Life was added to the financial objectives of the Women's Auxiliary in the Diocese of Virginia. Today in many parishes, money is given in thanksgiving for a birth, marriage, and anniversary, recovery from illness, a baptism or any other happy occasion. Here at Aquia, it has become a tradition for the ECW to contribute money in thanksgiving for the lives of special individuals who have worked long and tirelessly for the good of the church. These names are then recorded in the "Gift of Life" Book, a permanent record kept at the Mayo House. The money, which is contributed with each name nominated, goes to active Episcopalians with financial need from the Diocese of Virginia who are interested in furthering their education at seminary, college or technical school.

The names of people appearing in this book have been submitted and now appear in the "Gift of Life" Book. This is an ongoing project and each year we look forward to honoring other very special members of our Aquia Church family.
