FROM THE RECTOR

2021 Annual Meeting: August 22

Ànnual

Meeting

On Sunday, Aug. 22, we shall conduct our parish's annual meeting for this calendar year. Ordinarily we prefer to hold this yearly event on the first Sunday of the new year, for a variety of reasons; but back in January the pandemic changed that plan, as the pandemic has changed so many other routines.

On Aug. 22, we shall meet in the great hall of the Christian Formation and Fellowship Building for that morning's one worship service (which will start at 9 a.m. and will proceed as quickly as feasible) and remain there for the main business session (which will begin in earnest after a brief break following the conclusion of the worship service). While the meeting for adults and teen-

agers is going on upstairs in the great hall, downstairs our Sunday school ministry will have some opportunities for young children to enjoy a variety of activities. Refreshments will be available that morning for folks of all ages.

An important item of business at this year's annual meeting, as always, will be the election of new vestry members. This year, as always, we need to choose four adults who are duly enrolled members of this parish, who are confirmed (or are preparing for confirmation), and who have been faithful in making a financial pledge and contributing toward it during the year prior to election. Those elected to the vestry on this occasion would serve until the 2024 annual meeting (so around two-and-a -half years). If you are able to serve on the vestry and willing to serve if elected, then simply complete a blue nomination form, which is available at the back of the historic church building or available from the church office. Since nominations cannot be made by someone other than the nominee herself or himself, and since nominations cannot be made from the floor of the annual meeting, completed self-nomination forms should be submitted to the church office by

the stated deadline, which is the end of Monday, Aug. 16.

During the business session, you will hear some brief reports and updates from some of our key lay leaders: Bill Hoffman (senior warden and acting chairperson of our administration committee), Ron Korth (junior warden and chairperson of our

> buildings and grounds committee), and Chris Arey (treasurer and member of our finance committee). These lay leaders and other vestry members will be on hand to greet you and to answer your questions, either during the formal session or during informal conversation afterward. Vestry members who are rotating off will be thanked for their current term of service, which was extended

from the originally intended year to just over a year-and-a-half because of the pandemic: Christine Bowie, Michael Golasz, and Patricia Springer (with our thanks going also to the late Patty Montgomery, who died toward the end of her one-year appointment).

While the timing of this year's annual meeting is rather unusual for us, the reasons for our gathering remain unchanged: we shall celebrate the blessings of the year past, take care of present business, and lay the foundation for the future. The rector will also offer some words of encouragement and guidance in far less time than his usual seventeen hours. You know all too well the challenges that our parish has faced over the past months between the pandemic and other situations; and yet by God's grace Aquia Church has shown more than mere resilience amidst that adversity. I hope that you will make every effort to attend this annual meeting for some inspiration at a point in our parish's life and a point in history where such inspiration could certainly benefit us all.

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

Wednesday Morning Bible Study

ear Family in Christ, Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! I thank our God for you, especially for your love for Scripture and your diligent study of the same. Holy Scripture is the lens through which we see life as followers of Jesus. So, studying Scripture is incredibly important for us. As such, I encourage you to participate in either the Wednesday morning or Wednesday evening Bible study series that Fr. Jay and I offer weekly. I also encourage you to share with us any ideas or thoughts that you may have for series topics. Do you have a burning desire to study some of the Old Testament history books, like 1 and 2 Chronicles? Are you interested in a 2 Corinthians series as a follow-up to our series on 1 Corinthians? What themes in Scripture would you like to explore?

In my five-plus years at Aquia, we have covered a lot of ground in Bible study. We have completed a survey of the Old and New Testaments with the Kervgma series. We have studied Old Testament history in Genesis and Exodus. We have read some of the prophets like Daniel and Malachi. We have gone through some of the Old Testament writings like Proverbs and Job. I have taught a series on the Gospel according to Matthew as well as one on the Gospel according to Mark. We've read a large portion of Paul's letters: 1 Corinthians, Galatians, 1 and 2 Thessalonians, 1 and 2 Timothy, and Titus. We also have made our way through 1, 2, and 3 John, 1 and 2 Peter, Jude, and, of course, Revelation. We have explored some themes like "Hard Sayings of the Bible." And who could forget the series we had called Lectionary Leftovers, where we went through some key passages that we don't hear in the Sunday Eucharistic Lectionary? All of that is wonderful. But can you believe we have just scratched the surface?

In the upcoming months, I am looking at going through several books: the Letter to the Hebrews, Joshua and Judges, and 2 Corinthians. I am also contemplating doing



a series on the theme of violence in Scripture. However, I am always open to ideas for potential Bible study topics. Please do feel free and empowered to send me any ideas you may have for books of the Bible or themes in the Bible that you would appreciate exploring together. You can email me at rickenbaker@aquiachurch.org.

The study of Scripture is truly of central importance for us as Christians. As Paul tells us in 1 Corinthians 15:3-5, "For what I received I passed on to you as of first importance: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, and then to the Twelve" (emphasis added). Learning about what God has done for us in Christ Jesus is of **first importance** for who we are as believers. In learning about what God has done for us and in having the Word of God in Scripture opened to us by the Holy Spirit, we learn the truth of who we are and who God is calling us to be. The study of Scripture is vitally important for us. Come and join us in order to hear how God is at work in the world!

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.



VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS

June 15, 2021

Business Session

Opening Prayer and Lord's Prayer: The Rev. Jay Morris

Treasurer's Report:

- As of Sept. 30, 2021, there will be 11 months of mortgage payments in the account for the CFFB.
- Some online giving was reduced, probably due to the return to inperson worship and subsequent inperson giving.
- Treasurer's Report accepted unanimously by the vestry.

Minutes from Previous Meeting:

May vestry meeting minutes approved unanimously.

Old Business:

- R-2021-15: Increases in Hourly Rates for Nursery Workers (approved 5/18)
- R-2021-16: Replace Rectory Windows (approved 5/18): Junior Warden reported that the windows were in the process of being manufactured. 50% payment was required to begin the work, with the other 50% due upon completion. After this task is completed, the Rectory budget will be significantly depleted.
- R-2021-17: Replace Audio System in Historic Church
 (approved 5/18): \$1900.00 in
 donations already received for the
 replacement and upgrade to the
 sound system in the historic
 church; compliments are already
 being received by the clergy re-

garding the improved sound in the historic church.

New Business:

- R-2021-18: Policy About Contracts (Administration Committee): Policy is to ensure that all contracts have vestry oversight and approval. NOTE: calling the question regarding this item has been postponed until the next meeting, to study thoroughly the proposed policy regarding contracts. Thus, it will be the first item of business to be discussed at the July 2021 meeting.
- R-2021-19: Additional Authorization for Forms of Payment
 (Finance Committee): Due to the changing personnel in the office and the expectation of employing a new bookkeeper, increased options for office personnel to use some forms of electronic payment would ease the payment process for recurring charges; proof of payment by personnel would be mandatory.

 Any new authorization would be effective in September 2021. Unanimously passed.
- R-2021-20: Corrections about Purchases of Burial Rights (Rector): Resolution shows corrections to: R-2021-13 burial rights for Heather Joy Lynch, previously reported as Lot 206-8 to the corrected Lot 206-6; correction to R-2021-11 burial rights for Felicia Parlier, previously from Lot 206 to Lot 207 throughout the resolution; burial rights for spaces 1-3 and 6-8 in Lot 207. Unanimously passed.

Reports from Committees:

Building and Grounds: Report filed electronically.

Finance Committee: Mid-year review will occur in July 2021, and budget adjustments will be proposed as a result of the review.

Administration Committee: Bulletin boards have been transferred from the 1960 parish house and reinstalled inside

the CFFB, with an outside display pending.

Reports from Sr. and Jr. Wardens: *Junior Warden:* No further information. *Senior Warden:* Grateful for vestry's and parishioners' assistance filling in duties for worship now that in-person worship has been reinstated.

Rector's Report:

- Return to inside activities following suggested guidelines and at our own pace is now occurring.
- On 7/4/2021, 7:30 a.m. worship service will begin in-person but will still offer a virtual service at the same time through use of a prerecorded service.
- Use of the communion rail during the Eucharist will be discouraged due to the difficulty of disinfecting the wood of the rail, but also to provide a safety guideline against the growing COVID-19 variants.
- Morning Call will likely resume from 9:30 a.m.-10:15 a.m. on Sunday mornings.
- 4 p.m. will remain the time for the Sunday afternoon service.
- Different possible scenarios were discussed for the parish's annual meeting: Aug. 22 was set as the date for the 2021 annual meeting.

Our most notable moments are celebrated through flowers: birthdays, graduation, marriage, re-

tirement, and even death. Seasons are portrayed through flowers particular to spring, summer, fall, and even winter, with Christmas poinsettias. Flowers represent rebirth, resurrection, new beginnings, and promise for the future as a small seed evolves into stalks of colorful petals. Here at Aquia, we have a small ministry making a powerful impactthrough the art of flowers: the Flower Guild! Their creations grace our altar every Sunday, with additional floral adornment during special times of the liturgical calendar, such as Easter and Christmas. Aguia Church celebrates the Flower Guild ministry!

If you've ever wondered how to create beautiful arrangements while being a part of a meaningful ministry, the Flower Guild is welcoming new members. Previous experience is not required, as Betsy Husser explains: "Yes, yes, yes, we offer instructions! We are not professionals by any stretch of the imagination, but we love flowers, and love Aquia Church and the opportunity to be part of it!" Betsy and

longtime member Sheryl Colliver form the backbone of the group. Additional members include Jean Bittner, Margaret Hedger, Patricia Springer, and Penny Stevens, with Chris Bowie recently expressing an interest to join, too. Professional florist Faye Andrews offers expertise, as well. Church member Michael Golasz, who has been photographing the Sunday flower arrangements since July 2017, created an album on Facebook portraying a beautiful array of their creations, as you can see in some of his photos presented here.

Though never having arranged flowers before, Margaret Hedger joined the group during a ministry fair some years ago, inspired by Linda Hemming. Paired with experienced arrangers Ellen McLain,

Church members can sponsor floral arrangements in thanksgiving, celebration, or memory of a loved one by signing the Flower List in the back of the church and submitting a check to Sue Selz at the church office. Flower donations are listed in the Sunday bulletin, along with the donor's personal request. Once the services are over, the flowers are portioned into smaller bouquets and delivered to church members who are unable to attend church, or to church members recognized for their service at Aquia Church, or even placed on graves in our cemetery. All of this is possible because of the devotion of the Flower Guild, reflected in the words of Patricia Springer: "It is an honor to arrange, even as an amateur, to glorify Gods' presence at our worship services." Aquia Church members are thankful for the Flower Guild's longstanding dedication!
