

FROM THE RECTOR

Come, Labor On

t Aquia Church, September is always an interesting month. It begins as usual with Labor Day—which of course is not a holy day, even if this occasion does have its own collect in The Episcopal Church's current Book of Common Prayer (and the collect is worth praying: see pages 210/261). Because this secular festival serves not only as a moment to honor our efforts in our professional work and careers, but also as a chance to enjoy a brief break from their demands, Labor Day is probably observed more widely by folks avoiding church on that weekend than by folks attending church. Yet after Labor Day, the schedule and the pace of life return to normal, and soon enough we are back to school and back work around here, learning and laboring even more than before.

Around this time, families with children and youth realize that as the new school year has begun, so too have our ministry groups involving our younger members resumed, including the acolytes corps for students starting around 5th grade, the youth group for students in middle school and high school (grades 6-12), and Sunday school for students from pre-K level through 12th grade. Also around this time, we proceed with preparations for some pretty important events approaching, especially the ECW's annual Homecoming luncheon on the second Sunday of September (this year on Sept. 11, a date filled with its own memories in our national awareness) and our 65th annual Fall Fest (this year on the first day after September ends: Saturday, Oct. 1). And around this time, adults see that our Wednesday Bible studies, our Thursday choir rehearsals, and our Sunday sessions of Morning Call are very active, along with the weekly distribution of hot meals through Aquia's Table and the ber at Aquia Church offers good solutions.

weekly distribution of groceries through Aquia's Pantry.

After Labor Day, therefore, one gets the impression that there are lots of events and lots of opportunities around our parish for all sorts and condition of people. That's absolutely the correct impression to have during this month! September might start with resting from our labors, but increasingly the good folks at Aquia Church find that in September the calendar is full of gatherings, responsibilities, deadlines, and hard work—even if good work with good people for a good cause.

All these ministries and occasions can seem like nearly impossible challenges until we realize that none of us work alone in any of them. We collaborate with fellow Christians to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with others, in word and in deed, and we open our doors and our hearts to familiar faces and to complete strangers alike. We reach out to neighbors in need, and we reconnect with folks who have been away or sick for some of the summer. Before too long, we view the Aguia Church calendar as less of a burden (no bad, boring jobs here!) and more of a joyful opportunity to find delight in doing the work of the Lord, who guides and inspires us all in these endeavors.

Surely the adage is true: the devil can always find tasks for idle hands. Isn't it better to labor in the Lord's vineyard and be satisfied that way, than to rest on our laurels and sit on our idle hands? Aquia Church provides many opportunities for folks of all ages. Yet September is the right month for hearing the Lord inviting us: "Come, labor on" (see The Hymnal 1982, #541). If your hands and your life seem all too idle for your own good, then Septem-

lmighty God, you have so linked our lives with one another that all we do affects, for good or ill, all other lives: So guide us in the work we do, that we may do it not for self alone, but for the common good; and, as we seek a proper return for our own labor, make us mindful of the rightful aspirations of other workers,, and arouse our concern for those who are out of work; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

FROM THE ASSISTANT RECTOR

Why Aquia?

ear Family in Christ, Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! I thank our God for you, especially for how interested you are in teaching your children about why we worship like we do. At Aquia Church, we don't have a band up front or a coffee bar in the back. We don't have a special family room or a play-place for kids during worship (outside of the nursery, of course). At face value, Aquia is just not that flashy. We have old hymns. The priests wear weird robes. We have candles when electricity has been a thing for over 200 years. We have a 265-yearold building. For goodness' sake, we don't even have a restroom inside the church! We aren't up on the latest trends. So why do we worship the way we do?

The point of worship is not what it can do for you. Worship is not a consumer enterprise, at least not in the way presented above. There are many reasons why we do what we do in worship. The chief reason we come together each Sunday is to worship the one, true God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—who alone is worthy of worship. We sing hymns to him and give him thanks and praise for what he has done for us in Jesus Christ.


In worship we are recipients and consumers of a sort. What we consume is not coffee. What we receive is not special amenities. The purpose of coming to church is not childcare, merchandising, or anything else like that. We come to church to worship God and to receive his benefits. When we come to church, we hear God's word read and proclaimed. The word of God creates faith in our hearts (Rom. 10:17). The sermon expounds the Scriptures to show their truth and to proclaim what God has done for us in Christ. We consume the benefits of Christ's Body and Blood when we receive the sacrament of the Eucharist. When we receive that sacrament, we are strengthened in our faith and in the bond that God established with us in baptism. These things are at the center of our communal life at Aquia and in the

Church in general. They are most important. All other things come afterward. Priorities matter.

The things mentioned above can be done in any Christian congregation. However, many congregations don't bother to do them. Unfortunately, much of what passes for church today is a concert and a self-help speech. In saying that, I don't have a particular congregation in mind. I simply want to make clear that we prioritize the most important things at Aquia. We first worship God and sing our praises to him for what he has done. We then receive from him his Word and Sacrament. His Word in Holy Scripture is read and proclaimed for the people's benefit in order to create faith in our hearts. His Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist is celebrated and administered to the people so that we eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ and are strengthened in our faith and in our baptismal bond with God. If anything else supplants these things, then it is an idol and it is worthy of being torn down.

So we don't have all the flashy things that some other congregations have. But we have Jesus Christ crucified and raised for you. That is all you could ever need. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

September continues to be a busy time for the ECW. On Sept. 11, we shall once again host



Homecoming at Aquia. Immediately following the 10:30 service, everyone is invited to share in a reception to celebrate the end of summer and welcome families and friends back to Aquia. A signup sheet will be available on Sept. 4 for donations of a covered dish for all to enjoy, and/or to help with set-up beforehand and breakdown afterward. This time of visitation, communion, and renewal is indeed a celebration of Aquia! 65 years of Fall Fest—but who's counting?

Our annual event is well underway! This year's occasion isn't sneaking up on us, in fact, most of the preparation



began at the close of last year. On Saturday, Oct. 1, we will welcome everyone to our campus. The department chairs have many great ideas, and all our venues are back, including PJ the Clown, who will entertain both children and adults. We will take care with current health and safety compliances; we will continue to have nearly all our venues outdoors under tents or in the open air. The live auction under Shields Jones's capable hands will start at 11 a.m. near the parish house. Our handrubbed pork will be available in sandwiches, 1-lb. packages to go, and whole -butt pre-orders. AQUIA'S TABLE

eptember is National Hunger Aquia's Table quietly over the Awareness Month and Hunger Action Month—a month where people all over America stand together with Feeding America and the nationwide network of food banks to fight hunger. It's a month for spreading the word and taking action about the hunger crisis, and for dedicating ourselves to a solution. Members of Aquia's Table and Aquia's Pantry will wear an orange ribbon in support of ending hunger. We will have a basket in the church and in the great hall, grab a ribbon, pin it on, and wear it prominently in support of ending hunger!

One of our community partners, SERVE (meaning 'Stafford Emergency Relief through Voluntary Efforts'), has supported

last 11 years. SERVE donation boxes are in grocery stores throughout our community. The community at large benefits from your donations to SERVE as well as Aquia's Table.



We at Aquia's Table are currently preparing 350 meals weekly; our bakers bake five dozen to 10 dozen cookies or brownies once a month. Our menus are planned a month in advance, and sometimes are determined by the donations we receive. Lastminute shopping is usually done by three to four members of our team who also prepare and pack the meals, whether using brown bags or take-out containers. We



continue to serve our meals on a take-out basis and count the number of meals served. All of these hands and hearts work to serve a nutritious, healthy, and tasty meal weekly.

Aquia's Table continues to take action and dedicate our ministry to help end hunger.

ellow Aquians, your pantry continues its mission in the name of Jesus Christ by helping our neighbors who are foodinsecure. With the year 2022 already halfway done, here is some information that will show how your time, donations, and monetary contributions are helping God's children in our community:

9,407 people served and 62,262 pounds of groceries distributed

That's a monthly average of 1,568 people served and 10,377 pounds of groceries distributed.

The pantry also set attendance records in June, with 421 people served on June 8 and 442 people served on June 15. As we continue to grow, so does the need for your support in sustaining this important ministry here at Aquia Church. If you believe that the Holy Spirit is moving

Holy Cross Day: September 14

In April of this year, I undertook a walking holiday to the South Downs Way in the United Kingdom, a historic trail covering ground across Hampshire and Sussex. The trail began in the ancient city of Winchester—once the capital of Alfred the Great. While in Winchester, at the behest of fellow parishioner Jean Bittner, I visited the Hospital of St Cross and the Almshouse of Noble Land in AD 326-328 and founded Poverty—a peculiar name, I initially thought while I walked around the almshouse and the accompanying church and wandered through the gardens (where I saw a magnificent specimen of imperial fritillaria). St Cross may be an unfamiliar name in the U.S. (there is an Episcopal Church of St. Cross in Hermosa Beach, California), but the phrase 'Holy Cross' is synonymous with St. Cross and Holy Rood (or Holyrood, as it is known in some parts of the U.K.).

On September 14, the Feast of the Holy Cross is celebrated throughout Christianity. This feast honors Christ's self-offering on the cross for our salvation. In the Eastern Orthodox branch of Christianity, this feast is known as "The Exaltation of the Holy Cross" and was one of the 12 great feasts in the Byzantine liturgy. It is known as "The Triumph of the Cross" in the Roman Catholic Church. The 1979 Book of Common Prayer is the first American Prayer Book to include Holy Cross Day.

The origin of this feast day dates to antiquity. Recall that the first Christian Roman Emperor, Constantine the Great, convened the First Council of Nicaea in AD 325; this is the council which gave us the origin of the Nicene Creed. After the Council, in the year 327, the Bishop of Jerusalem, Bishop Macarius, at the behest of the emperor, began to search for the sites of the Passion, Crucifixion, and Resurrection of Jesus in Jerusalem. Most of Jerusalem had been razed by the Romans in AD 70; then in 129-130, when the Emperor Hadrian founded a new colony, Aelia Capitolina, he centered it over the ruins of the former Jewish capital. The history of the True Cross—the cross upon which Jesus was crucified—is blurred with less reliable traditions. There are no contemporary accounts that the followers of Jesus preserved the cross. Late fourth-century historians write that Helena, the mother of Constantine, travelled to the Holy churches there. According to legend, when she came to Jerusalem, she discovered three crosses, one later revealed to her as the True Cross, together with the crosses that held the two criminals who were crucified with Jesus. Bishop Macarius is credited with excavating Jerusalem till finding the sites of the Crucifixion and the Holy Sepulcher. As noted church historian Diarmaid McCullough writes,

It is possible that there had been a continuous Christian tradition as to the whereabouts of these sites and that therefore there was not much revealing to be done. Less plausibly, it was not long before the Jerusalem Church was announcing that the actual wood of the Cross had been rediscovered, and within a quarter-century another enterprising Bishop of Jerusalem, named Cyril, was linking that discovery to an undoubted historic event: a state visit to the Holy City by Constantine's mother, the dowager Empress Helena.

On September 14 in the year 335, a complex of buildings was dedicated. These were built by the Emperor Constantine in Jerusalem on the sites of Jesus' crucifixion and his tomb. This shrine included a large basilica and a circular church. Claims made by the Church of Jerusalem that they possessed the True Cross date from the mid -fourth century. Also, in the late fourth century, the pilgrim Egeria mentions a feast commemorating the discovery of that Cross in Jerusalem. This feast has also been associated with the exposition at Jerusalem of the Cross by the Byzantine Emperor Heraclius (575-641). He



recovered the relic from the Persians. who took it from Jerusalem in 614 when they destroyed the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. While the authenticity of alleged relics of the Cross may be questionable, Holy Cross Day provides an opportunity for a joyous celebration of Christ's redeeming death on a cross.

The contemporary collect for Holy Cross Day is this: "Almighty God, whose Son our Savior Jesus Christ was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world to himself: Mercifully grant that we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, in glory everlasting. Amen" (BCP 244).
