FROM THE RECTOR

Since You Need Refreshment, Come and Get It

Then we hear some version of the word 'refresh,' certain ideas come to mind. Upon learning that 'refreshments will be served' at an event, we want to enjoy light snacks there. After spending hours in the hot sun of summer (perhaps working in the yard or garden or going swimming), we want to drink something refreshing, like a glass of ice water or lemonade. When you need to refresh your memory, you want to recall some details that have slipped your mind. Whenever a supply of something important has become depleted, the supply needs to be refilled or revived, and we need a pick-me-up to get us back on track again.

Life is full of challenges that can leave us parched and thirsty—whether physically, emotionally, or spiritually—and not only in the summer heat, but at any point of the year and at any stage of life. No wonder Jesus said, "Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you" (Matthew 11:28 / BCP 332). Jesus knew that occasionally each of us requires refreshment in body or mind or spirit, and so refreshment is what he offers.

Of course we shouldn't think that Jesus is simply a snack or a treat, nor that Jesus is like "the pause that refreshes" (to borrow an old slogan from Coca-Cola). Instead, Jesus offers us what he offered the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well in John 4: he offers himself as the source and well-spring of eternal life. He invites us to join our lives with his life, and to take his life as the pattern for our lives, in ways that will lead to an abundance of real life.

The Samaritan woman at the well had earned a bad reputation for herself as a lady of loose living, but her former recklessness did not stop Jesus from speaking with her in public; apparently he welcomed the chance to begin a conversation and a relationship with her. Jesus' warmth toward her must have been quite refreshing to her. In fact, Jesus spoke bluntly with her about how she was wasting her life, but Jesus' honesty did not stop their exchange; obviously she was willing to continue lis-

tening to him. Jesus' candor toward her might have been surprisingly refreshing to her. When she returned to her village and told folks there that the Messiah had finally arrived, she kept telling them about the power and the truthfulness of Jesus, and presumably she began to live like a Christian. The woman's conversion must have been completely refreshing to those around her.

Recall that the Samaritan woman came to the well at high noon in order to gather some water for herself, then Jesus requested some water from her. Here she is, hot and sweaty from the heat of the day—yet Jesus asked her for a drink. While he was physically thirsty, she was emotionally drained and spiritually dry. Even so, give her some credit: she came to the well in search of water, yet she left with something even better than what she desired.

Being involved with church is very much like this scene from John 4. We can easily regret some parts of our past, and too often we try to live with our tank spiritually empty. Jesus will always listen to us, he will always speak with us, he will always be truthful for us, and he will offer us not just temporary relief from being parched and thirsty, but enduring refreshment that leads to something even better than we can ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20). Yet it surely helps when we leave the house and seek that desperately needed refreshment.

Freedom

Dear Family in Christ,
Grace to you and peace from God
our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! I
thank our God for you, especially for how
you live into the freedom that we have in
Christ Jesus our Lord. Freedom is a gift.
It's something that we celebrate each July
4 as we remember those who gave their
lives to found this free and independent
country of the United States. As the Korean War Memorial in Washington, D.C.,
says, "Freedom is not free." With respect
to our American society, that is indeed
true. But with respect to Christ, it is not.

I love American history. I'm especially fond of World War II history. It probably has something to do with the fact that my dad knows almost all there is to know about WWII German U-boats. This love of American history was instilled in me very early on. So it follows that I know just how hard-fought and hard-won American freedom is. I have countless family members throughout the centuries of American history who have fought in one branch of the military or another. My brother is currently serving in the U.S. Army. This freedom that we have as Americans came at the cost of the blood and sweat of many men and women. It deserves to be honored, to be sure.

With all of that in mind, though, I have found concerning a recent, popular trend in American culture. An ad popped up on Facebook the other day that promoted a new patriotic Bible. The cover had an American flag on it. I found myself unsettled at that. It has nothing to do with shame around the flag or anything like that, rest assured. But it does have to do with the idea of a patriotic faith. I am an American. I am a Christian. I am not an American Christian. Let me explain. The intermingling of American identity with Christian identity tends to skew both. I am a Christian because I have faith in Jesus Christ and have been baptized, not because I was born in South Carolina. The latter fact makes me an American. God's grace is available to all, not just those in the United

States. There are myriad concerns that come into play with the intermingling of American identity and Christian identity. But one of the bigger ones I can see is the difference in the way those two identities view freedom.

In America, the freedom that we have was earned by the service of men and women. As Christians, the freedom we have was bought and paid for by the blood of Jesus Christ, through no merit or work of our own. We contribute nothing to our salvation. It is the free gift of grace alone given to us by faith alone through the work of Jesus Christ alone. Yes, we have responsibilities as Christians. Yes, God desires things of us. But the freedom that we have in Christ was bought and paid for by Christ alone. That freedom is now for good works to be shared with our neighbors who are in need, keeping in mind the Great Commission that we have been given as disciples of Jesus.

I am proud to be an American. I am proud to be a child of God. I am proud of my brother and others who have fought for my freedom. I am thankful to God that my true freedom was purchased by Christ alone. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.




