FROM THE RECTOR

A Month for Celebration

ovember begins about as well as any month could. November 1 is All Saints' Day, when we give thanks for the reality that among the saints of God are included not just those renowned people whom the Church has officially designated as saints but also all baptized Christians, who together constitute "the communion of saints" (as we affirm in the Apostles' Creed), regardless how great or how little their fame or their accomplishment. On the second day of November, in an extension of All Saints' Day, we remember the faithful departed, or "all souls." At Aquia Church as in some other places, we observe All Saints' Day on the first Sunday in November, and on that occasion we name in our prayers those who departed this life during the year prior.

Near the end of November, on the 28th, comes the feast day of Kamehameha IV and Emma, the royal couple who helped to bring Anglicanism to the Hawaiian islands and who personally set the tone for so much good work on behalf of Christianity there. In their humility, they helped to construct a hospital, schools, and a cathedral; they worked to bring the first Anglican missionaries and the first Anglican bishop to the region, and the king himself engaged in translating the Book of Common Prayer and many Anglican hymns into the Hawaiian language.

Within the rest of November are a bevy of days honoring some remarkable Anglicans like Richard Hooker (Nov. 3) and C. S. Lewis (Nov. 22—see Chris Arey's article on him later in this issue). Hooker and Lewis are acclaimed for their significant achievement in apologetics, which is a form of



is a form of theology that involves giving well-reasoned defenses and explanations of Christian beliefs and practices (apologetics does *not* mean

apologizing for mistakes). Other feast days recognize such bishops and leaders as William Temple (Nov. 6), who helped guide the Church of England through much of World War II, quite earlier missionaries and bishops on the European continent like Willibrord (Nov. 7) and Martin of Tours (Nov. 11), and distinguished preachers and evangelists like Charles Simeon (Nov. 12). On Nov. 14 we recall the consecration of Samuel Seabury as the first bishop in The Episcopal Church, despite the fact that he had been a British loyalist and a Redcoat chaplain during the American Revolution. The charitable benevolence of Margaret, an English princess who became the queen of Scotland and who worked tirelessly to found orphanages, schools, and hospitals and to raise the standards of living for others, is acclaimed on Nov. 16. (Seabury and Margaret represent important examples of genuine reconciliation lived out in everyday life.) Still other days in November are devoted to other saints even less well known and less widely remembered but no less worthy than those mentioned here.

We dare not forget that November also features Thanksgiving, that great day for consuming copious quantities of turkey, dressing, gravy, football, plus required rest and relaxation afterward. Nor should we forget that this quintessentially American holiday traces its roots to celebrations in colonial Virginia and Massachusetts that were expressions of gratitude to God for his provisions for the needs of his people. But unfortunately we risk forgetting that our contemporary and historical celebrations of Thanksgiving are grounded ultimately in the Holy Eucharist-from a Greek word meaning 'thanksgiving'because we Christians are thankful for what God has always given so graciously: our lives, our opportunities for freedom and happiness and service, and our salvation. Let's be sure to remember that last one: salvation itself.

Surely November is a month for celebration.

grief. After his death, his authorship was made public.

The collect for Lewis's feast day is: "O God of searing truth and surpassing beauty, we give you thanks for Clive Staples Lewis, whose sanctified imagination lit fires of faith in young and old alike.

Surprise us also with your joy and draw us into that new and abundant life which is ours in Christ Jesus, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen." (Lesser Feasts and Fasts, 2022).

Fall Fest 2023

C. S. Lewis

F or many older Americans, the date Nov. 22, 1963, is burned into their memories. Indeed, many people (including myself) can tell you exactly where they were on the day President Kennedy was assassinated. The enormity of this event eclipsed the death of another man, whose legacy and contributions to the faith have only increased with time. Clive Staples Lewis, better known as C.S. Lewis—author, poet, scholar, and lay Anglican apologist is recognized annually by the Church on the anniversary of his death, Nov. 22.

The story of Lewis' life journey has been told in biographies and film (as late as 2021, The Reluctant Convert) and at the eponymous C. S. Lewis Institute. His literary contributions to Christianity have influenced millions of people and have helped shaped the understanding of our faith. He was born in 1898 in Belfast, Ireland. His father was a solicitor, his mother was university educated, and with his older brother Warren, grew up in a very literary household, where he was known as 'Jack.' He attended boarding schools and prepared to enter Oxford, but service in France during World War I delayed his studies. At Oxford he excelled, graduating in 1922. In 1925 he became a fellow and tutor at Magdalen College, Oxford, where he stayed until 1954. From 1954 to 1963 he was professor of medieval and Renaissance English at the University of Cambridge.

Though raised in the Church of Ireland, he became disillusioned with his faith, and as a teenager became an atheist. His atheism was amplified by his service during the First World War. In 1918, the 19-year-old second lieutenant, mired in the dystopian horror of trench warfare on the western front, was serving with the Somerset Light Infantry. In April of that year, he was wounded by artillery, and eventually medically evacuated back to England. Though he regained some of his appreciation for life, he did not abandon his atheism until he completed his studies and joined the faculty at Oxford, and engaged with other academics who weaned him away from atheism to belief in God in 1929 and eventually to Christianity in September 1931. In his book *Surprised by Joy*, he wrote this about his return to God:

"You must picture me alone in that room in Magdalen [College, Oxford], night after night, feeling, whenever my mind lifted even for a second from my work, the steady, unrelenting approach of Him whom I so earnestly desired not to meet. That which I greatly feared had at last come upon me. In the Trinity Term of 1929. I gave in, and admitted that God was God, and knelt and prayed: perhaps, that night, the most dejected and reluctant convert in all England."

Central to his return to the faith was his relationship with J.R.R. Tolkein, a veteran of the Battle of the Somme and devout Catholic, whom Lewis first met in 1926. Lewis joined Tolkein and other Oxford academics, and others (including his older brother Warren, and Tolkein's son Christopher) in informal literary discussions, and became one of the 'Inklings,' a group whose members encouraged literary pursuits.

Lewis wrote poetry from an early age, and eventually published 30 books. As his renown increased during World War II, he spoke on the BBC about faith. From 1941 to 1943, he broadcast from London while the periodic air raids occurred. Later, these broadcasts were anthologized into his book, *Mere Christianity*. In 1942 he wrote *The Screwtape Letters*, a Christian apologetic epistolary novel which he dedicated to J.R.R. Tolkein and which remains popular today. (Aquia Church explored *The Screwtape Letters* as a Lenten study book a few years ago.)

Intrigued with fantasy literature from an early age, between 1949 and 1954 he wrote *The Chronicles of Narnia*, a series of seven novels. The novels take place in Narnia, a fantasy world

of magic, mythical beasts and talking animals. It recalls the adventures of several children who play pivotal roles in the unfolding history of the Narnian world. Early in World War II, Lewis took in three evacuated children, and explored the idea of a book based on the experiences of children. Lewis stated that he did not intentionally craft the stories as allegorically Christian. In an essay in 1956, he wrote: "This is all pure moonshine. I couldn't write in that way. It all began with images; a faun carrying an umbrella, a queen on a sledge, a magnificent lion. At first there wasn't anything Christian about them; that element pushed itself in of its own accord." He took the name Narnia from Narni, a town in Italy whose Latin name (Narnia), appealed to him. Narni is in Umbria, halfway between Rome and Assisi. The Chronicles of Narnia has been in publication continuously since 1950, has sold more than 120 million copies, and has been translated into 47 languages. It has been adapted for stage, radio, film and television and is considered one of the classic works in children's literature.

Lewis married late in life. At age 57, in 1956 he married Joy Davidman Gresham, an American divorcee, in a civil ceremony, and their marriage was blessed a year later in the church. She was diagnosed with terminal cancer and died in July 1960. Lewis's book *A Grief*

Landscaping Project: An Update

arlier in 2023 the Vestry approved L the creation of a task group to focus on enhancing and beautifying our church grounds. The Project to Landscape the Aquia Church Environment (PLACE) task group—comprising Jeanelle Wells, Penny and Bob Stevens, Carol Korth, Sheryl Colliver, Christine Hammer, and Chris Arey-took on this challenge.

If you are observant, you will see the fruits of their labor around the Fleurries and main entrance to the cemetery. Though we initially met with some landscape designers, we were thrilled when Jeanelle appeared among us as a parishioner who is a professional landscape architect. The Vestry approved a plan devised by Jeanelle. With the expertise of Penny Stevens (our certified master gardener and purchasing agent) and her husband Bob (who is a wizard with his earth-moving machinery), the task group has largely finished

the first phase of the plan: beautification church buildings, exempting our 1757 around the Fleurries. The plantings will take a couple of years to grow to their intended size. We will be planting some annuals to provide some color over the late fall and winter.
