

FROM THE RECTOR

When December Disappoints – and Why It Can't

S ometimes December disappoints us. We want to take in all the holiday hoopla and have a holly jolly Christmas, but we can't squeeze everything into our schedules. We want to attend all the parties and eat all the sweet treats, but then we couldn't squeeze in our clothes. We want to buy all the presents we 'owe' our relatives and friends and neighbors, but we simply can't squeeze any more money out of our wallets and purses. Throughout December, pressure squeezes us from every angle.

Sometimes December disappoints us in even deeper ways. We mourn those who have died this past year, and we miss their presence. We miss those who live too far away for a visit, or the at-long-last visit seems too short. With our short attention spans, we get distracted from focusing on the real significance of Christmas, and then we feel shortchanged spiritually. Throughout December, we run short on perspective and patience.

Sometimes December disappoints us at the depth and core of our existence. As the present year charges toward its end and the new year rushes to replace it, we might reflect on mistakes from the past-the things we did wrong, the good we failed to do, the missed opportunities-but might not get around to what should come after that reflection: namely, repentance. After all, it is always easier to moan in misery for what we have suffered than to acknowledge remorse over how we contributed to our own suffering and to the suffering of others, not to mention how hard it is to resolve that we must do better next time. You don't have to suffer from seasonal affective disorder to recognize how much about our lives and our world is truly disordered in ways that are contrary to what God expects from us-so much so

that many of us seem no longer to know about or to care about what God desires for us. That disheartening, dystopian disinterest renders us all the more depressed. And when we don't receive the presents we wanted or the good news we sought or the answers to our prayers as we coveted them, then we worry that we lived throughout December in vain.

Yet there can still be heard the message that never disappoints: "but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive Him still, the dear Christ enters in." No matter how plagued by sin and other forms of disappointment we find this world, God still strives to bring chaos into order by inserting himself into this world—as an infant born in that little town of Bethlehem who grew in stature and in wisdom, who lived perfectly for imperfect people in an imperfect world, and who gave up his life in death on the cross and was raised back to life, never to die again.

For all the difficulty we face in the dark days of December, by its end there is always the light of Christ breaking forth, bursting through, and guiding us toward something better than before. This year's December begins with the first Sunday of Advent, as we anticipate the joy that shall eventually be ours at the end of time when our Lord returns to us. Until then, our yearly remembrance of God's incarnation in Jesus brings us hope for the future as nothing else can. During the extended season of Christmas, the new year offers a renewed opportunity to rely on God's grace to draw us closer to him and to each other.

That is why, ultimately, what we truly celebrate in December can never disappoint us.

The Second Coming of Christ

"For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God..."

(I Thess. 4:16-17)

ear Family in Christ, Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ! I thank our God for you, especially for how intentional you are about prayer. Jesus taught us to pray to the Father, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done." During the Advent season, our eyes, hearts, and minds are focused on the coming kingdom. We are focused on the second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. Throughout the centuries, the return of Christ has often been seen as a day that brings fear and anxiety. Many have thought of it as a day to avoid. But the Scriptures speak of his return differently. They teach us that Christ's return is good news!

In the Gospel according to Luke, Jesus tells us that there will be many concerning events leading up to his return. But he finishes this statement by saying: "Now when these things begin to take place, straighten up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near" (Luke 21:28). When Christ returns, it is for our redemption. It is to draw us to himself. It is to make all things right and all things new. When he comes again, it is good news.

In First Thessalonians, Paul tells us the good news about Jesus' second coming: "For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord" (I Thess. 4:16-17). When Christ comes on that great and last day, it will be so that we can be with him forever. No longer will sin threaten us. On that day, sin and death, which have plagued us since the Fall (see Gen.3), will die. Satan will be dethroned. And all of those who are in Jesus will rise to new and everlasting life. When Christ comes again, it is good news.

The author of the Letter to the Hebrews tells us more good news when he writes: "And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him" (Heb. 9:27-28). When Christ returns, it is for our salvation. We who have seen how far the world has strayed from God, will be saved on account of Jesus Christ's death for our sins. We know that Christ Jesus did not come to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him (John 3:17). So when Christ comes again, that will be good news.

There are so many other places to look in the Scriptures to see that when Christ comes, it will be a joy-filled day. In the interim, may this Advent be one of repentance and faith for you. May this Christmas be one of hope for you, even when the world tries so desperately to rob us of our hope. Let this season of expectation and longing be one of prayer for the return of Jesus. For it is indeed good news. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

AQUIA'S PANTRY

E ach week, Pantry volunteers combine your contributions with donations picked up from four supermarkets, four convenience stores, and the Fredericksburg Regional Food Bank to give to 120 to 140 families. We are thankful for all these gifts and for our awesome volunteers. Aquia's Pantry requires 90 to 100 volunteer hours each week to make this happen. We are so very grateful to God for all these gifts of food and time and talent.

Our guests are thankful as well! In October we were asked by the food bank to hand out a brief questionnaire to see how well we were fulfilling our guests' needs. The last question asked: "How has this food pantry impacted your daily life or your family's wellbeing?" Nearly half of the guests wrote a note. Here are a few answers of the many that touched our hearts.

"Before learning of this church we were having to skip multi meals each week. Thank you for all you do for this community!"

"I needed a food bank that I could go to after work hours. I need to work and can't afford to take off. This has helped 10-fold! Also, we only have 1 car for 3 families. It is nice I can pick up for all of us!"

"For me and my children it is very helpful. Thank you very much to all those who make it possible for us to obtain these foods. God bless you."

"It has brought needed joy and peace alongside simple words of encouragement the staff offers. This ministry goes beyond the vehicle of food distribution. The love is indeed felt. Blessings to you all!"

Treasurer's Note

Monetary contributions intended for 2024 must be received by the church by 31 December 2024 or be postmarked by 31 December 2024. Contributions such as checks which are dated in 2024 but which are received after 31 December 2024 or postmarked after 31 December 2024 will be counted towards 2025. Electronic contributions must be made by the end of 31 December 2024 to count towards 2024.

After 31 December 2024, for in-kind donations made during this year which have not previously been identified, parishioners are asked to provide the receipts to the office as soon as possible. In the event that inkind receipts are not received by the church office before end-of-year statements are produced, the Treasurer will provide a separate statement for these in-kind donations.

End-of-year contribution statements for 2024 will be available at church in mid-January 2025. Any discrepancies should be referred to Sue Selz, our parish administrator, for resolution.

In the new year, if you are requesting a reimbursement for an inkind contribution, please consider holding your request until you reach the amount of \$25.00. Each of our security-enhanced checks costs nearly a dollar, and postage for mailing each check continues to increase, so we are trying to minimize the cost of producing checks for small dollar amounts. If this is not feasible for you, then we will process your check per your request.


